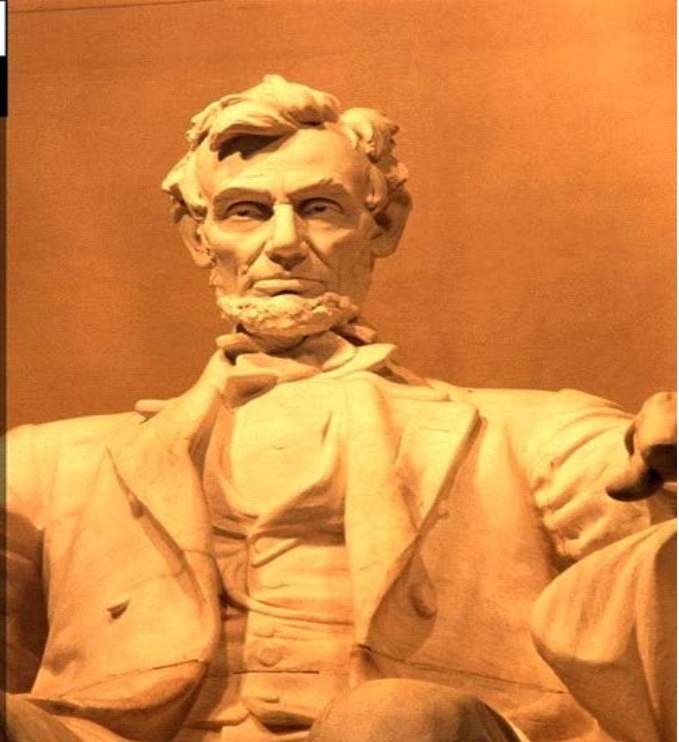
I ACKNOWLEDGE CLASS WARFARE EXISTS
